Week 1: Introduction to Arrays

Lesson 1: What are Arrays?

Date: Monday, January 5, 2026
Week: 1

Learning Objectives:

- Define what an array is
- Understand why arrays are useful in programming
- Identify real-world examples of arrays

Teaching Methodology/Strategy:

- Direct instruction
- Guided discussion
- Visual aids (whiteboard drawings)

Lesson Planner & Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Ask students to think about how they organize their school supplies
2. Define arrays (10 minutes)
 - Explain arrays as a way to store multiple items of the same type
 - Use the analogy of a row of lockers or a box of crayons
3. Discuss the importance of arrays (10 minutes)
 - Explain how arrays help organize and access data easily
4. Real-world examples (10 minutes)
 - Brainstorm with students about everyday examples of arrays
5. Wrap-up and preview next lesson (5 minutes)

Activities:

- Class discussion: "When have you needed to organize many similar items?"
- Whiteboard activity: Draw different types of arrays (e.g., bookshelf, parking lot)

Homework:

- Write a short paragraph about three examples of arrays you see in your daily life

Tips & Strategies for Teachers:

- Use physical objects in the classroom to demonstrate arrays
- Encourage students to share their own examples

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Why Do We Need Arrays?



- Imagine trying to keep track of 100 different numbers without grouping them
- Arrays let us store related information together
- They make it easier to sort, search, and perform operations on data
- Can you think of a time when organizing things made your life easier?



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Array Basics: Index and Elements

- Elements: The items stored in an array
- Index: The position of each element (starting from 0)
- Example: `fruits[3] = "banana"` means "banana" is at index 3
- Why do you think computer scientists start counting at 0 instead of 1?

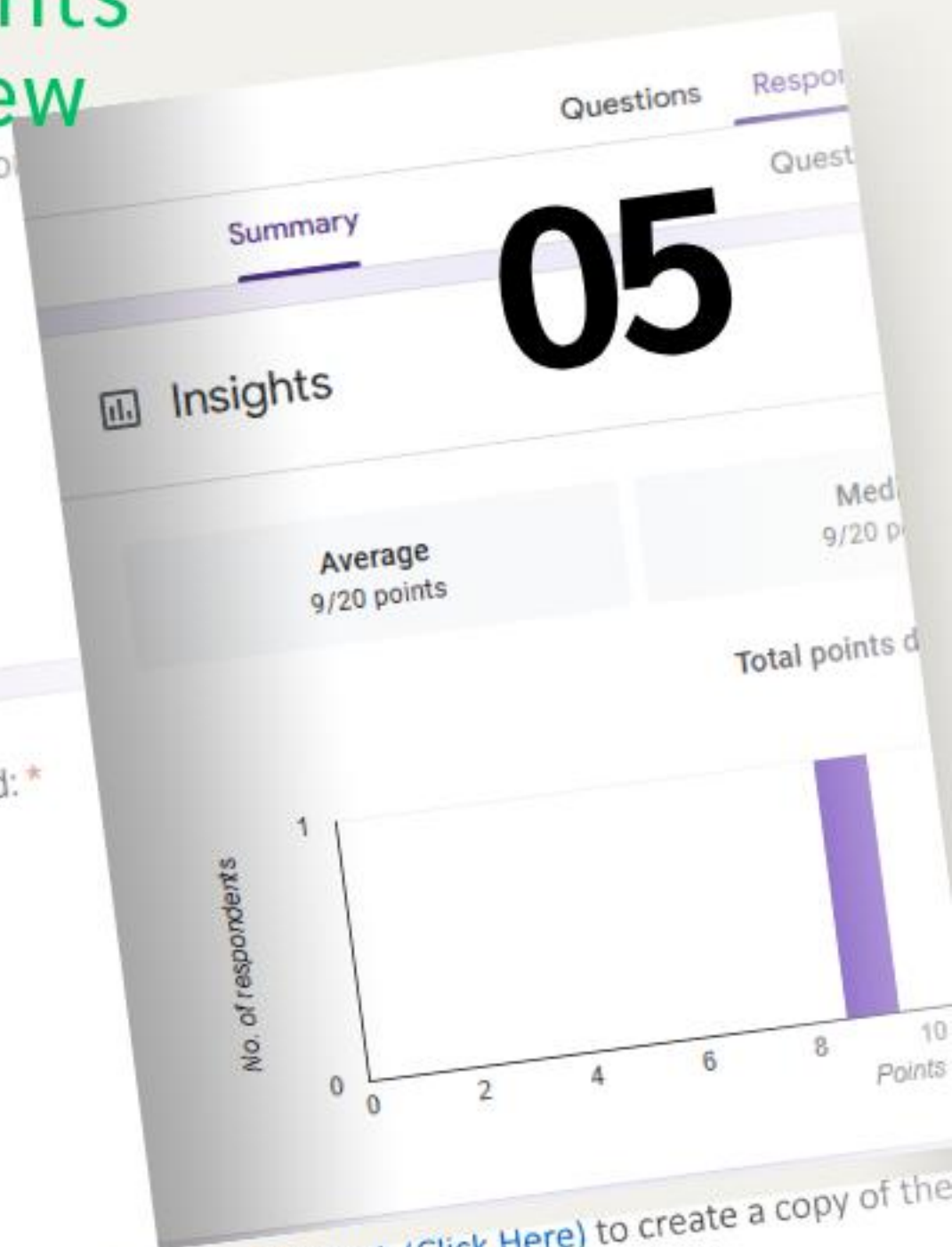

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command, while an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.

What is the main purpose of an exclamatory sentence?
