Week 1: Introduction to Author's Purpose

Day 1: Monday, January 5, 2026

Lesson Plan: Understanding Author's Purpose

Learning Objectives:

- Define author's purpose
- Identify the three main purposes: Persuade, Inform, Entertain (PIE)
- Explain why understanding author's purpose is important

Teaching Methodology:

- Direct instruction
- Class discussion
- Think-Pair-Share

Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Ask students to think about why people write
 - Introduce the concept of author's purpose
2. Direct Instruction (15 minutes)
 - Define author's purpose
 - Explain the three main purposes (PIE)
 - Provide examples of each purpose
3. Think-Pair-Share Activity (15 minutes)
 - Students think of a book they've read recently
 - Pair up and discuss the purpose of their books
 - Share findings with the class
4. Conclusion (5 minutes)
 - Recap the importance of understanding author's purpose
 - Preview next lesson on identifying purpose

Homework:

- Write a paragraph explaining why understanding author's purpose is important

Tips for Teachers:

- Use familiar books as examples to help students connect with the concept
- Encourage students to share their own reading experiences

What is Author's Purpose?

- Author's purpose is the reason why an author writes something
- Three main purposes: to Persuade, Inform, or Entertain (PIE)
- Understanding the purpose helps you better comprehend what you read
- Can you think of a book you've read recently? What was its purpose?



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Informing: Sharing Knowledge



- Purpose: To teach or explain something to the reader
- Examples: textbooks, news articles, how-to guides
- Look for: facts, data, explanations
- How do you know when an author is trying to inform you?



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Persuading: Changing Minds

- Purpose: To convince the reader of an opinion or to take action
- Examples: advertisements, opinion pieces, campaign speeches
- Look for: strong language, emotional appeals, arguments
- Can you think of a time when someone tried to persuade you?

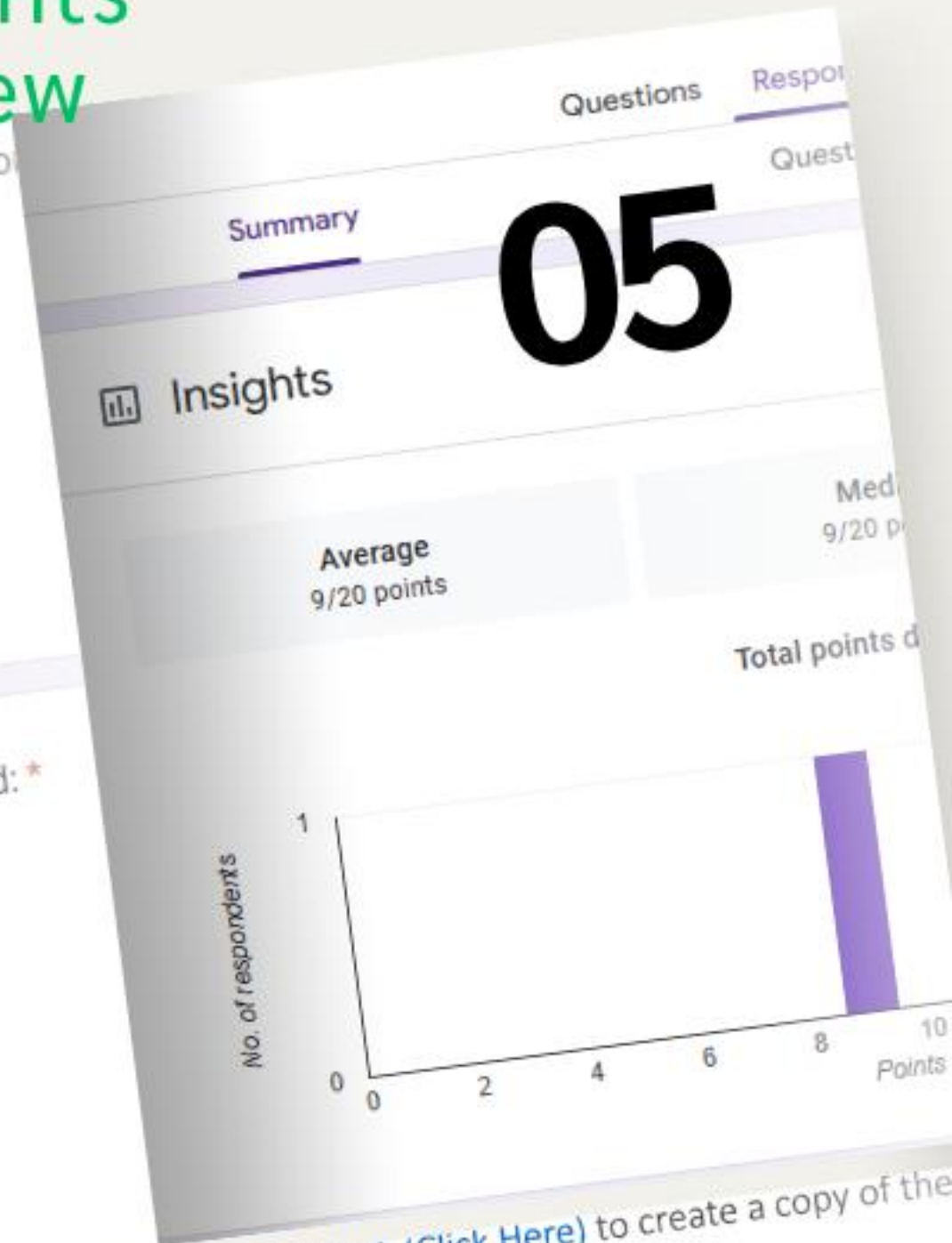

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command, while an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.
