## Cause and Effect Unit Plan

### Week 1: Introduction to Cause and Effect

#### Lesson 1: What is Cause and Effect?

Date: Monday, January 5, 2026  
Week: 1

##### Learning Objectives:

- Define cause and effect
- Identify cause and effect relationships in everyday situations
- Understand the importance of cause and effect in various subjects

## What is Cause and Effect?

- Cause: The reason something happens
- Effect: What happens as a result
- Think of it like dominoes falling!
- Can you think of a cause and effect in your daily life?



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## Identifying Cause and Effect



- Look for key words: because, so, therefore, as a result
- Ask: "Why did this happen?" (cause) and "What happened?" (effect)
- Remember: Causes come first, effects follow
- Practice: Find the cause and effect in this sentence: "It rained, so the picnic was canceled."

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## Cause and Effect in Stories

- Characters' actions (causes) lead to consequences (effects)
- Plot events are often connected by cause and effect
- Example: Cinderella loses her shoe (cause), leading the prince to search for her (effect)
- What cause-and-effect relationships can you find in your favourite story?

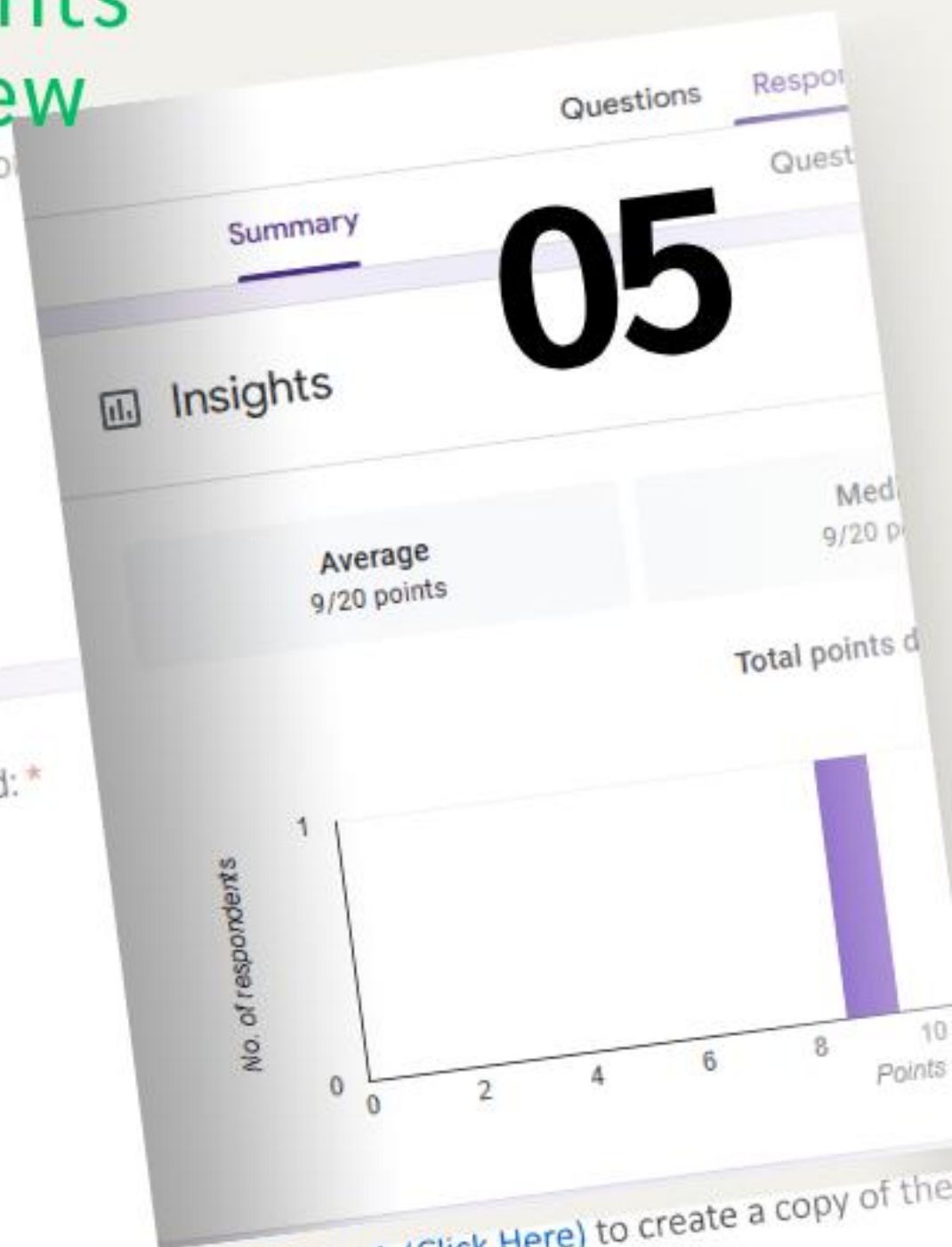

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### Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.  
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.  
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command, while an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.
