Constitution Lesson Plans

Week 1: Introduction to the Constitution

Day 1: Monday, September 7, 2026

Lesson Plan: What is the Constitution?

Learning Objectives:

- Define the Constitution and its purpose
- Identify when the Constitution was written and ratified
- Explain the basic structure of the U.S. government as outlined in the Constitution

Teaching Methodology: Direct instruction, class discussion, think-pair-share

Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes):
 - Begin with a quick poll: "What do you know about the Constitution?"
 - Introduce the topic and learning objectives
2. Direct Instruction (15 minutes):
 - Present key information about the Constitution using Slides 1 and 2
 - Explain what the Constitution is, when it was written, and its purpose
3. Think-Pair-Share Activity (10 minutes):
 - Pose the question: "What do you think life would be like without rules?"
 - Students think individually, then discuss with a partner, and finally share with the class
4. Class Discussion (5 minutes):
 - Discuss how the Constitution acts as a "rule book" for the country
5. Conclusion and Preview (5 minutes):
 - Recap key points
 - Preview next lesson on the Founding Fathers

Homework:

- Write a short paragraph answering the question: "Why do we need a Constitution?"

Tips for Teachers:

- Use simple analogies to help students understand the concept of a constitution (e.g., rules for a game, school handbook)
- Encourage students to draw connections between rules in their daily lives and the idea of a national constitution

What is the Constitution?

- The Constitution is the supreme law of the United States
- It was written in 1787 and ratified in 1788
- It outlines the structure of our government and citizens' rights
- Think of it as the "rule book" for our country
- What do you think life would be like without rules?

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The Founding Fathers



- A group of leaders who created the Constitution
- Includes George Washington, James Madison, and Benjamin Franklin
- They wanted to form a stronger, united government
- Worked together to compromise and create a fair system
- Who's your favourite Founding Father and why?

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Three Branches of Government

- The Constitution divides power into three branches:
- 1. Legislative (makes laws)
- 2. Executive (enforces laws)
- 3. Judicial (interprets laws)
- This system creates "checks and balances"

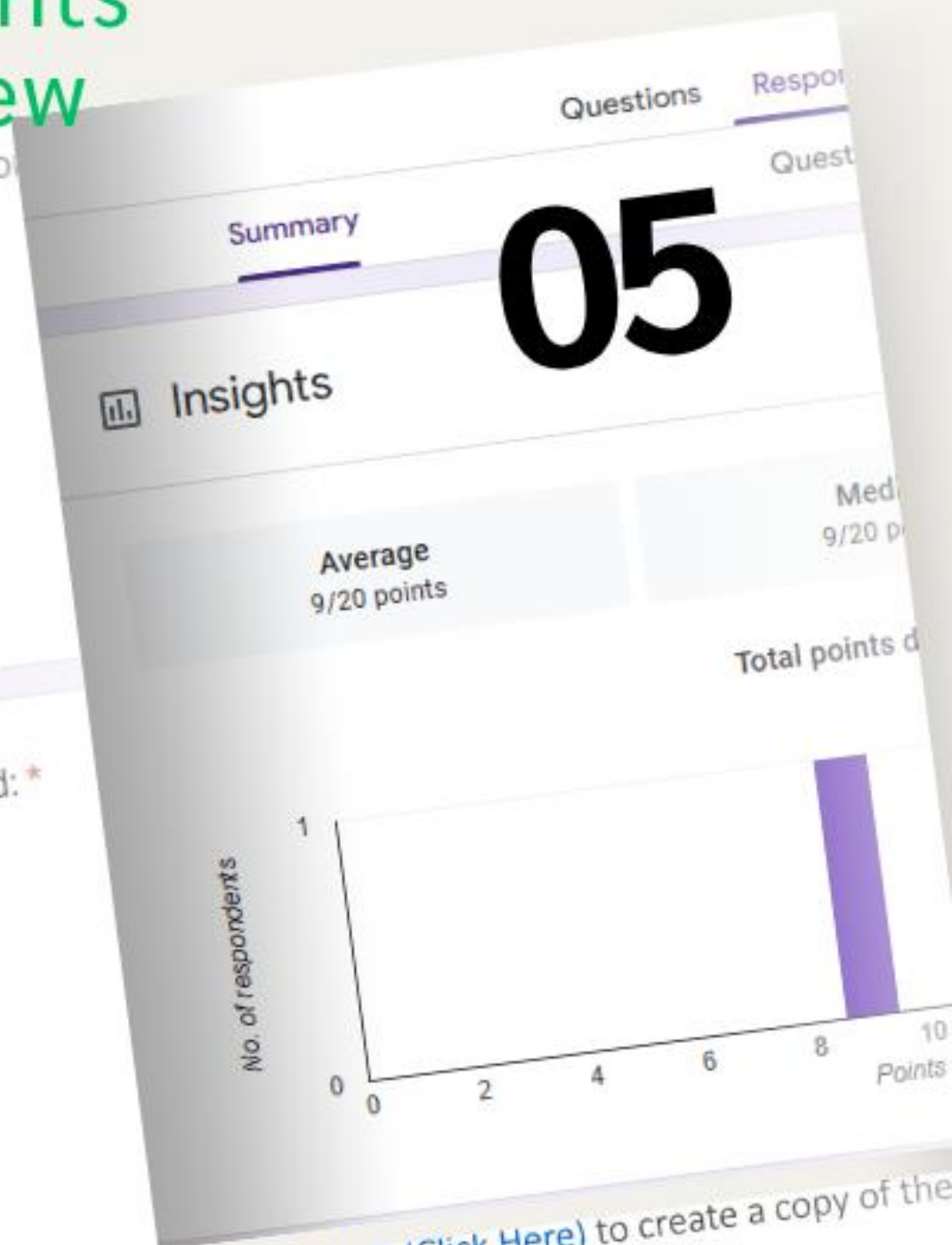

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command, while an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.

What is the main purpose of an exclamatory sentence?
