Week 1

Day 1: Monday, January 5, 2026

Lesson 1: Introduction to Idioms

Learning Objectives:

- Define what an idiom is
- Distinguish between literal and figurative meanings of idioms
- Identify common idioms in everyday language

Teaching Methodology/Strategy:

- Direct instruction
- Group discussion

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What Are Idioms?



- Idioms are groups of words with a meaning that's different from the individual words.
- They're like secret codes in our language!
- Example: "It's raining cats and dogs" doesn't mean animals are falling from the sky.
- What do you think it really means? Discuss with a partner!



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The Parts of an Idiom

- Idioms have two main parts:
- 1. The literal meaning (what the words actually say)
- 2. The figurative meaning (what the phrase really means)
- Can you spot the difference between these two meanings in "break a leg"?
- Activity: Draw a picture of the literal meaning and the real meaning of this idiom!

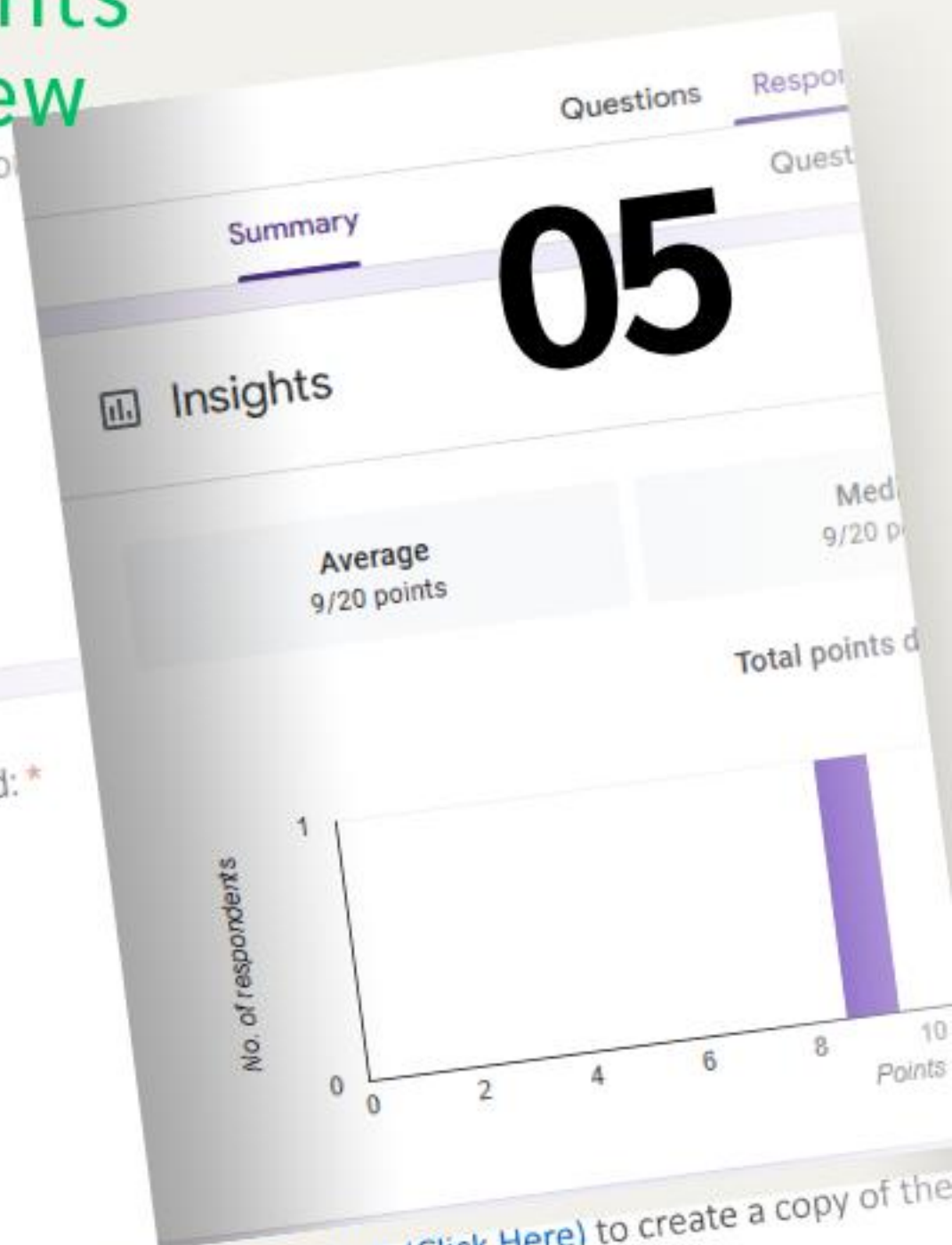

Q1: Define a declarative sentence and provide an example.

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express a strong feeling or emotion.
Example: "What a beautiful day!"

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command.
Example: "Close the door." While an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.
Example: "Close the door now!"
