Week 1: Introduction to Main Idea

Day 1: Monday, January 5, 2026

Learning Objectives:

- Define the concept of main idea
- Differentiate between main idea and details
- Identify the main idea in simple texts

Teaching Methodology:

- Direct instruction
- Think-pair-share
- Guided practice

Lesson Planner & Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes):
 - Begin with a short story and ask students what it was mostly about
 - Introduce the term "main idea"
2. Direct Instruction (10 minutes):
 - Explain what a main idea is using Slide 2 content
 - Discuss the difference between main idea and details using Slide 3 content
3. Think-Pair-Share Activity (10 minutes):
 - Have students think of their favorite book
 - Pair up to discuss the main idea of their books
 - Share some examples with the class
4. Guided Practice (10 minutes):
 - Provide short paragraphs and guide students in identifying the main idea
5. Closure (5 minutes):
 - Recap the definition of main idea

- Preview next lesson on finding the main idea

- Class Work: Short paragraph analysis worksheet
- Home Work: Find the main idea of a newspaper article

Tips for Teachers:

- Use relatable examples from students' lives to explain main idea
- Encourage students to explain their reasoning when identifying main ideas

What is a Main Idea?

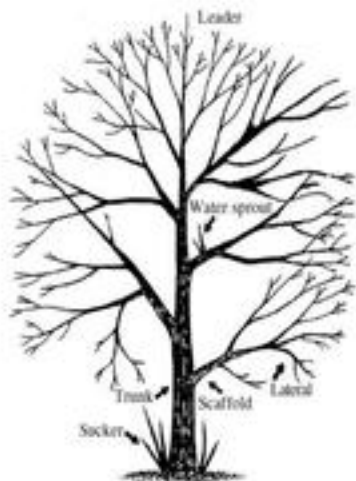
- The main idea is the most important point of a text
- It's what the author wants you to remember
- Think of it as the "big picture" or the "heart" of the story
- Can you think of a time when you explained the main idea of a movie to a friend?



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Main Idea vs. Details



- Main idea: The trunk of the tree (central point)
- Details: The branches and leaves (support the main idea)
- Let's practice: What's the main idea of your favorite book?
- How do the details in that book support the main idea?

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Finding the Main Idea

- Look for repeated words or phrases
- Pay attention to the first and last sentences
- Consider the title - it often gives clues
- Ask yourself: "What is this mostly about?"
- Can you spot the main idea in today's newspaper headline?

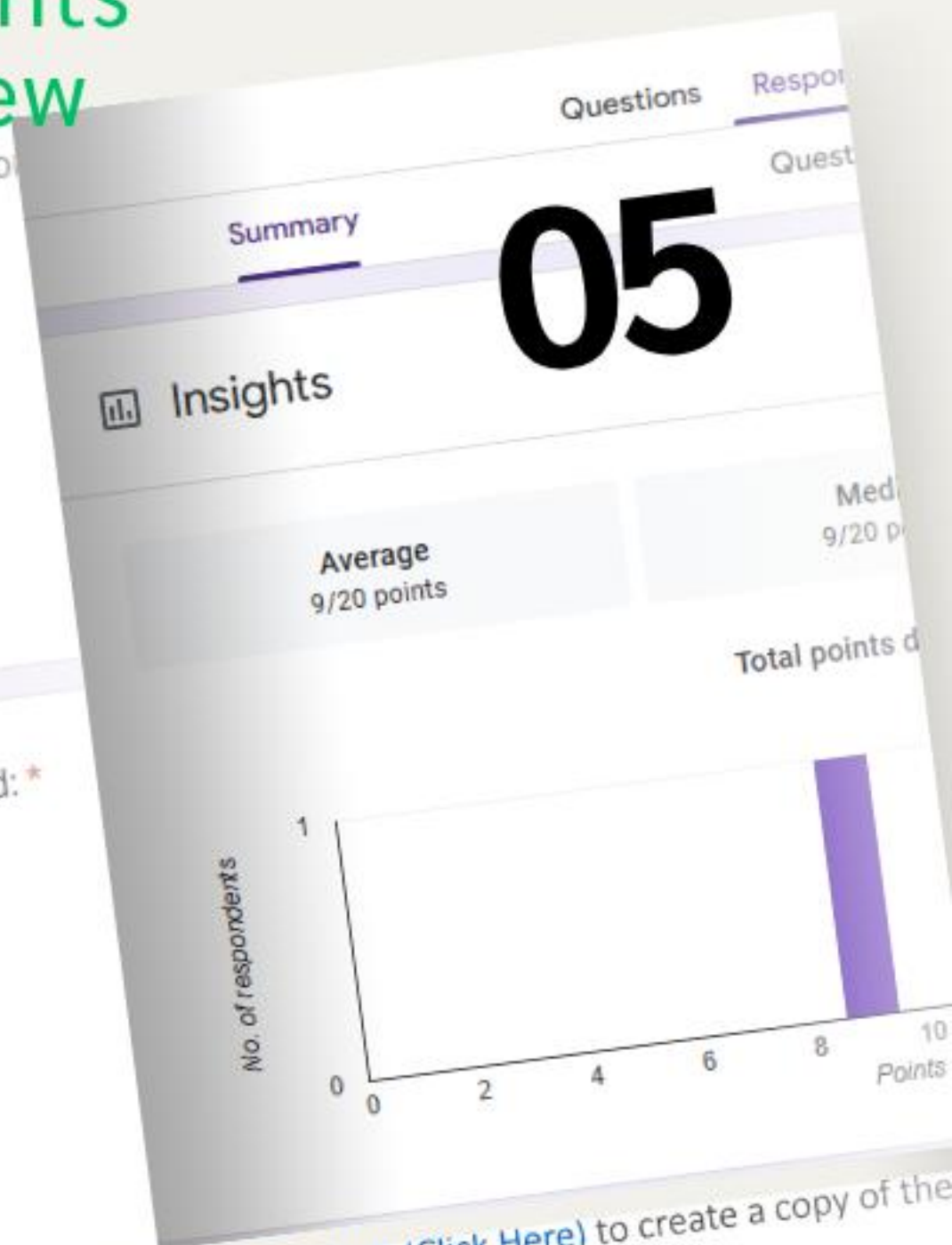

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command, while an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.

What is the main purpose of an exclamatory sentence?
