Lesson 1: What is a Plot?

Date: Monday, January 5, 2026
Week: 1

Learning Objectives:

- Define plot in storytelling
- Understand the importance of plot in narrative structure
- Identify the basic elements of a plot

Teaching Methodology/Strategy:

- Interactive lecture
- Class discussion
- Visual aids (plot diagram)

Lesson Planner & Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Ask students to share their favorite stories
 - Introduce the concept of plot
2. Main Lesson (20 minutes)
 - Define plot as the sequence of events in a story
 - Explain how plot gives structure and meaning to a story
 - Introduce the basic elements of plot (Exposition, Rising Action, Climax, Falling Action, Resolution)
3. Activity (10 minutes)
 - In small groups, have students identify the plot elements in a well-known fairy tale
4. Conclusion (5 minutes)
 - Recap the main points

- Preview the next lesson on exposition

- Class Work: Plot element identification in fairy tales
- Homework: Read a short story and identify its plot elements

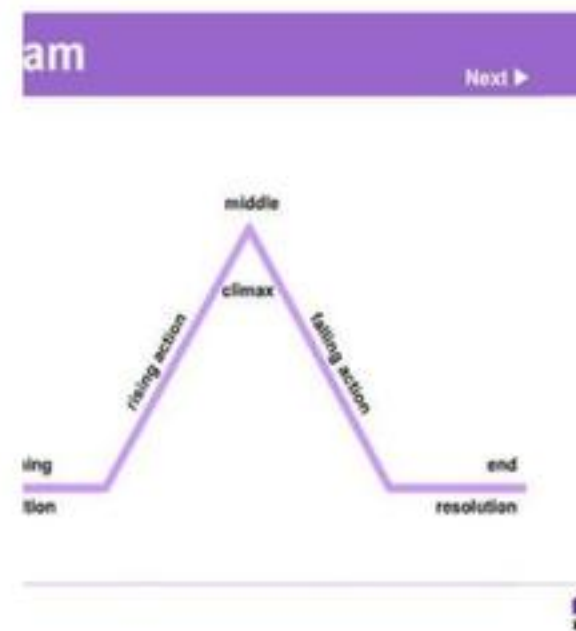

What is a Plot?

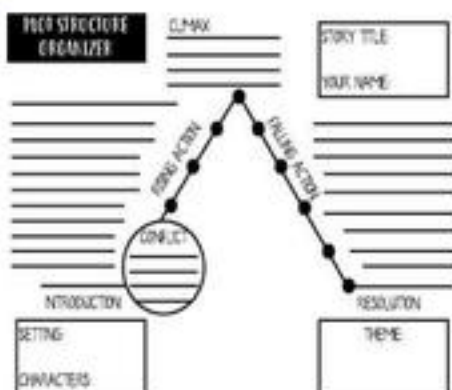
- The sequence of events in a story
- Like a roadmap for the characters' journey
- Gives structure and meaning to the story
- What do you think makes a good plot?



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Elements of Plot



- Exposition: Setting the scene
- Rising Action: Building tension
- Climax: The most exciting part
- Falling Action: What happens after
- Resolution: How it all ends
- Can you think of a story and identify these elements?

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Exposition: Setting the Stage

- Introduces characters, setting, and background
- Provides important information for the story
- Usually at the beginning, but can be spread out

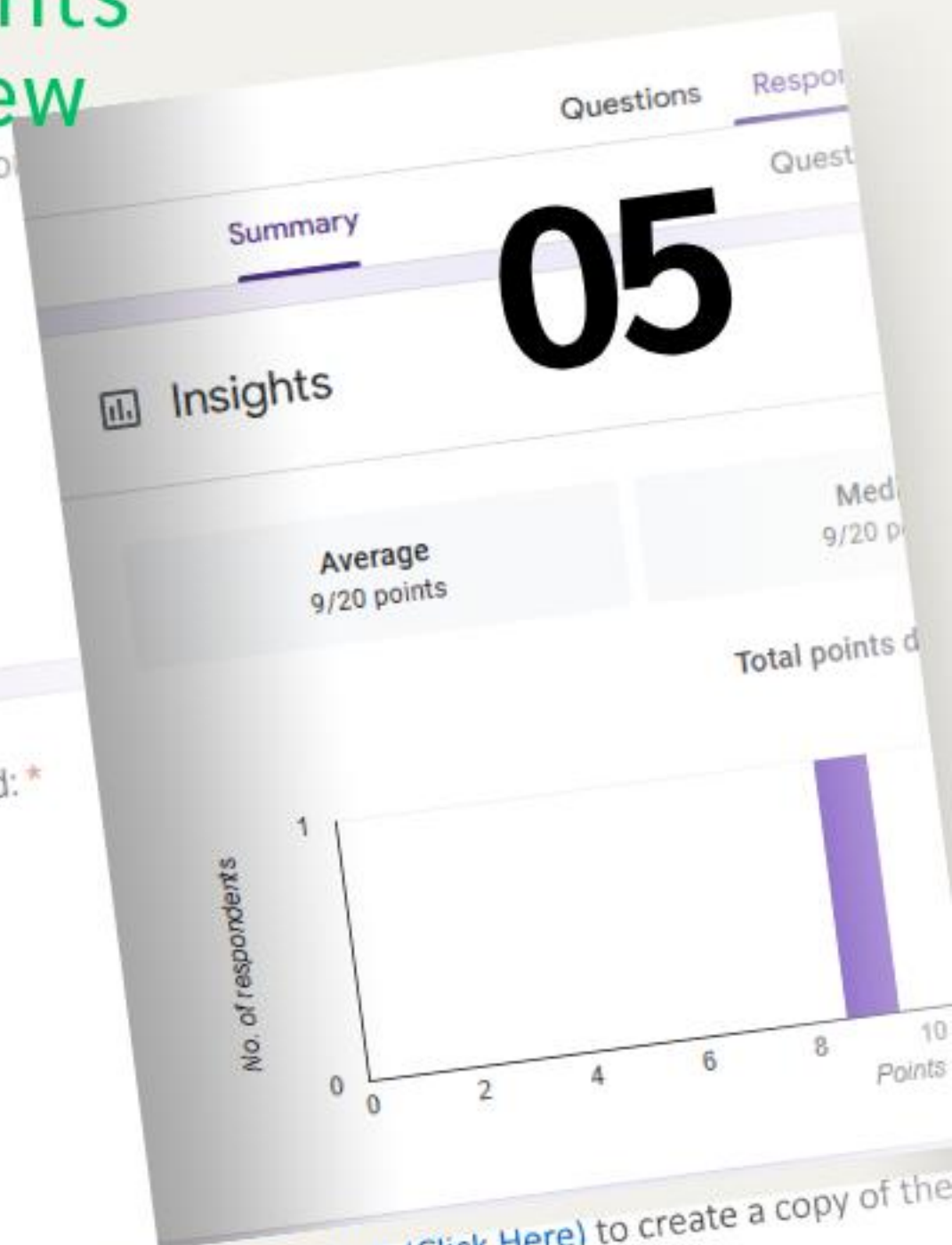

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command. An exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.
