Prepositions Unit Plan

Week 1: Introduction to Prepositions

Day 1 (Monday, January 5, 2026)

Learning Objectives:

- Define prepositions
- Identify common prepositions in sentences
- Understand the role of prepositions in showing relationships between words

Lesson Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Begin with a quick game: "Simon Says" using prepositions (e.g., "Simon says put your hands on your head")
2. Presentation (15 minutes)
 - Introduce the concept of prepositions using Slides 1-3
 - Discuss examples and have students identify prepositions in sample sentences
3. Activity (15 minutes)
 - "Preposition Hunt": Students search for prepositions in a short text and underline them
4. Wrap-up (5 minutes)
 - Review findings from the Preposition Hunt
 - Preview next lesson

Homework:

- Create 5 sentences using different prepositions

Day 2 (Tuesday, January 6, 2026)

Learning Objectives:

- Understand prepositions of time
- Use prepositions of time correctly in sentences

Lesson Plan:

1. Review (5 minutes)
 - Go over homework from previous day
2. Presentation (10 minutes)
 - Focus on prepositions of time using Slide 4
3. Activity (20 minutes)
 - "Time Preposition Bingo": Create bingo cards with different time prepositions. Call out sentences, and students mark off the correct preposition on their card.
4. Wrap-up (5 minutes)
 - Discuss any challenging prepositions from the game

- Write a short paragraph about your daily routine using at least 5 prepositions of time

What Are Prepositions?

- Prepositions are words that show relationships between other words
- They often tell us about position, time, or movement
- Examples: in, on, under, before, after, through
- Can you spot the prepositions in this sentence? "The cat jumped over the fence and landed in the garden."



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Common Prepositions

- Time: at, on, in, during, before, after
- Place: in, on, at, under, over, between
- Movement: to, from, across, through, into, onto
- Let's play a game! Can you think of a sentence using three different prepositions?

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Prepositions of Time

- At: Used for specific times (at 3 o'clock, at noon)
- On: Used for days and dates (on Monday, on July 4th)
- In: Used for longer periods (in summer, in 2023)
- During: Used to show when something happens (during the movie)
- What preposition would you use to say when school starts?

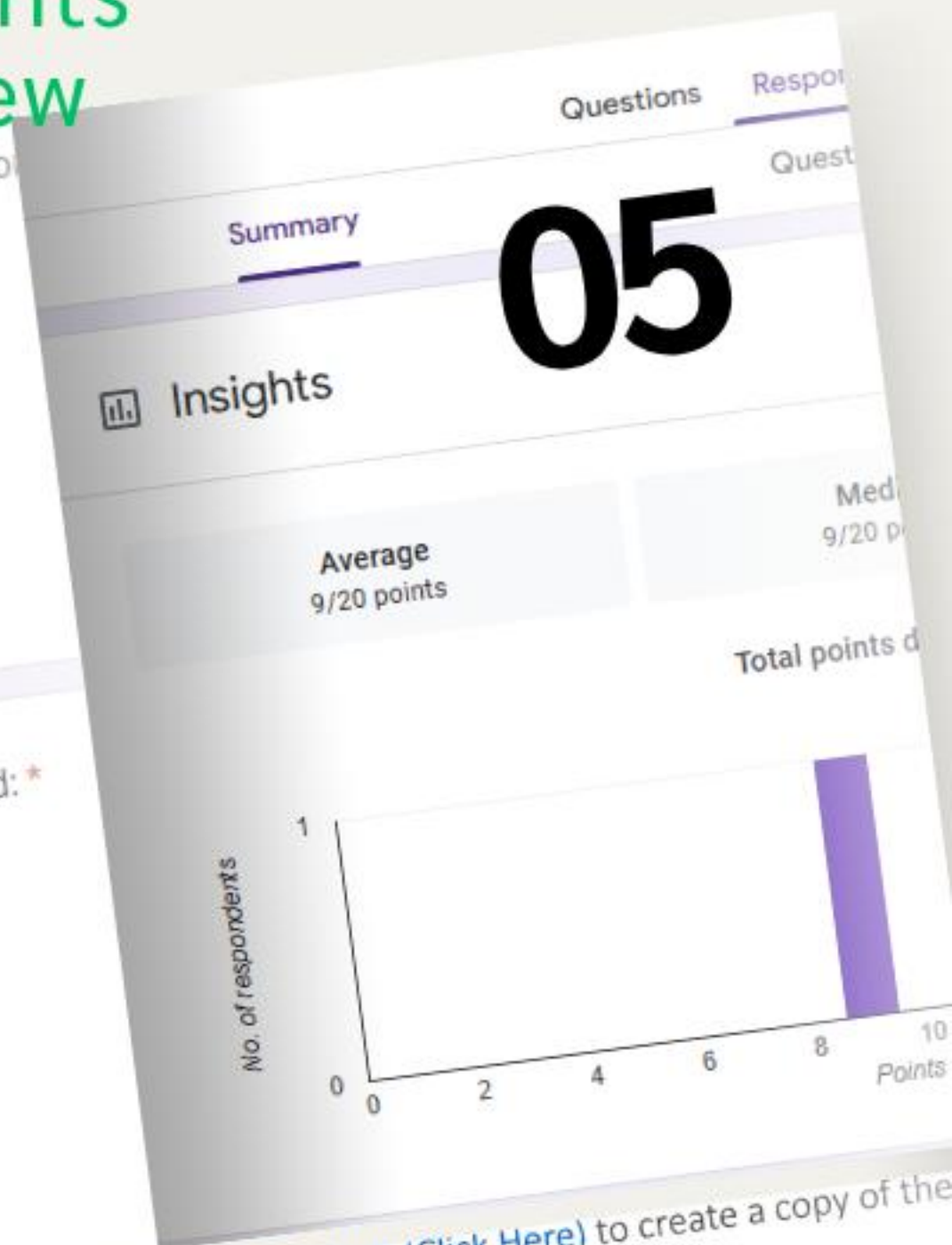

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express a strong feeling or emotion.
Example: "What a beautiful day!"

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command.
Example: "Close the door."
