Lesson 1: What Are Parts of Speech?

Date: Monday, August 17, 2026

Duration: 40 minutes

Learning Objectives:

- Define parts of speech
- Understand the importance of parts of speech in language
- Identify the main categories of parts of speech

Teaching Methodology:

- Direct instruction
- Class discussion
- Interactive activities

Lesson Planner & Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Welcome students and introduce the topic
 - Show Slide 1 and 2 to set the stage
2. What Are Parts of Speech? (10 minutes)
 - Present Slide 3
 - Explain the concept using the sports team analogy
 - Encourage students to share parts of speech they already know
3. Interactive Activity: Parts of Speech Brainstorm (10 minutes)
 - Divide the class into small groups
 - Each group brainstorms words they think belong to different parts of speech
 - Share and discuss as a class

4. Memory Aid: NAVAP (10 minutes)

- Introduce the NAVAP memory aid (Slide 15)
- Have students create their own words for each letter

5. Conclusion and Preview (5 minutes)

- Recap the main points of the lesson
- Preview the next lesson on nouns

Activities and Resources:

- Whiteboard for brainstorming
- NAVAP handout

Homework:

- Write 5 sentences, trying to use at least 3 different parts of speech in each

Tips for Teachers:

- Use plenty of real-world examples to make the concept relatable
- Encourage student participation to gauge their prior knowledge

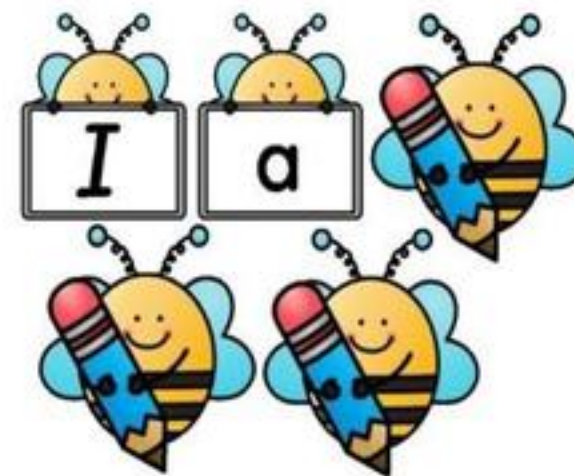

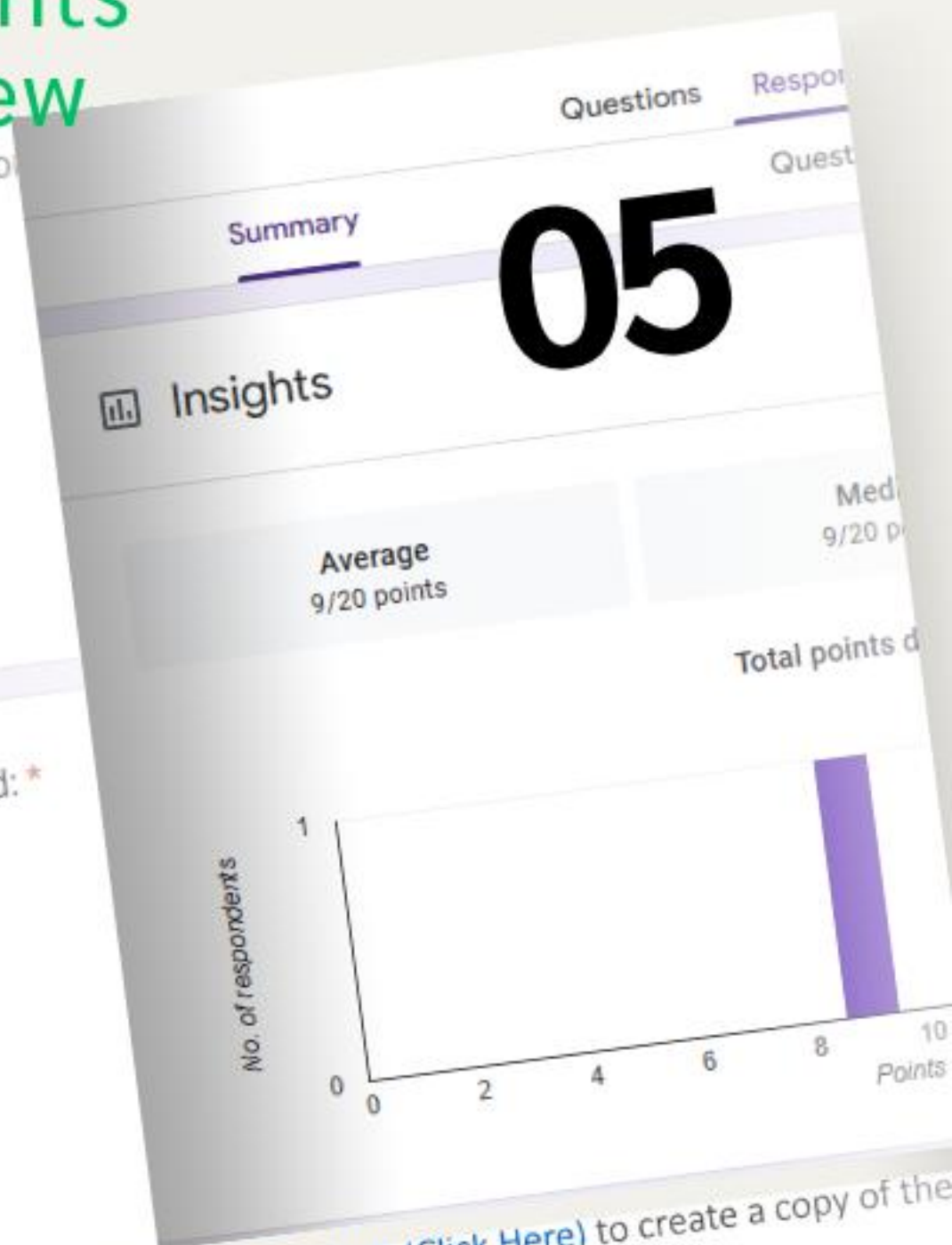

Q1: Define a declarative sentence and provide an example.

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express a strong feeling or emotion.
Example: "What a beautiful day!"

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command.
Example: "Close the door." While an exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.
Example: "Close the door now!"
