Subject and Predicate: Comprehensive Lesson Plans

Week 1: Introduction to Subject and Predicate

Lesson 1: What is a Sentence?

Date: Monday, August 17, 2026

Duration: 40 minutes

Learning Objectives:

- Define what a sentence is
- Understand that a sentence expresses a complete thought
- Recognize that a sentence has two main parts: subject and predicate

Teaching Methodology/Strategy:

- Direct instruction
- Guided practice
- Group discussion

Lesson Planner & Detailed Plan:

1. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Welcome students and introduce the topic of sentences
 - Ask students to share what they know about sentences
2. Direct Instruction (10 minutes)
 - Define a sentence: "A group of words that expresses a complete thought"
 - Explain that every sentence has two main parts: subject and predicate
 - Provide simple examples on the board
3. Guided Practice (15 minutes)
 - Write several sentences on the board
 - Ask students to identify whether each group of words is a complete sentence or not
 - Discuss why or why not as a class

4. Group Activity (8 minutes)

- Divide students into pairs
- Have them create 3 sentences and 3 non-sentences
- Share with the class and explain their reasoning

5. Conclusion (2 minutes)

- Recap the main points of the lesson
- Preview the next lesson on subjects

Activities, Resources, Class Work:

- Whiteboard and markers for examples
- Handout with sentence examples for guided practice
- Notebook for pair activity

Home Work:

- Write 5 complete sentences about their day

Tips & Strategies for teachers:

- Use simple, relatable examples to illustrate complete thoughts
- Encourage students to "test" if their sentence expresses a complete thought

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What is a Sentence?



- A sentence is a group of words that expresses a complete thought
- It always has two main parts: subject and predicate

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Meet the Subject!

- The subject is the star of the sentence
- It tells us who or what the sentence is about
- Usually a noun or pronoun
- Question: Who or what is doing the action?

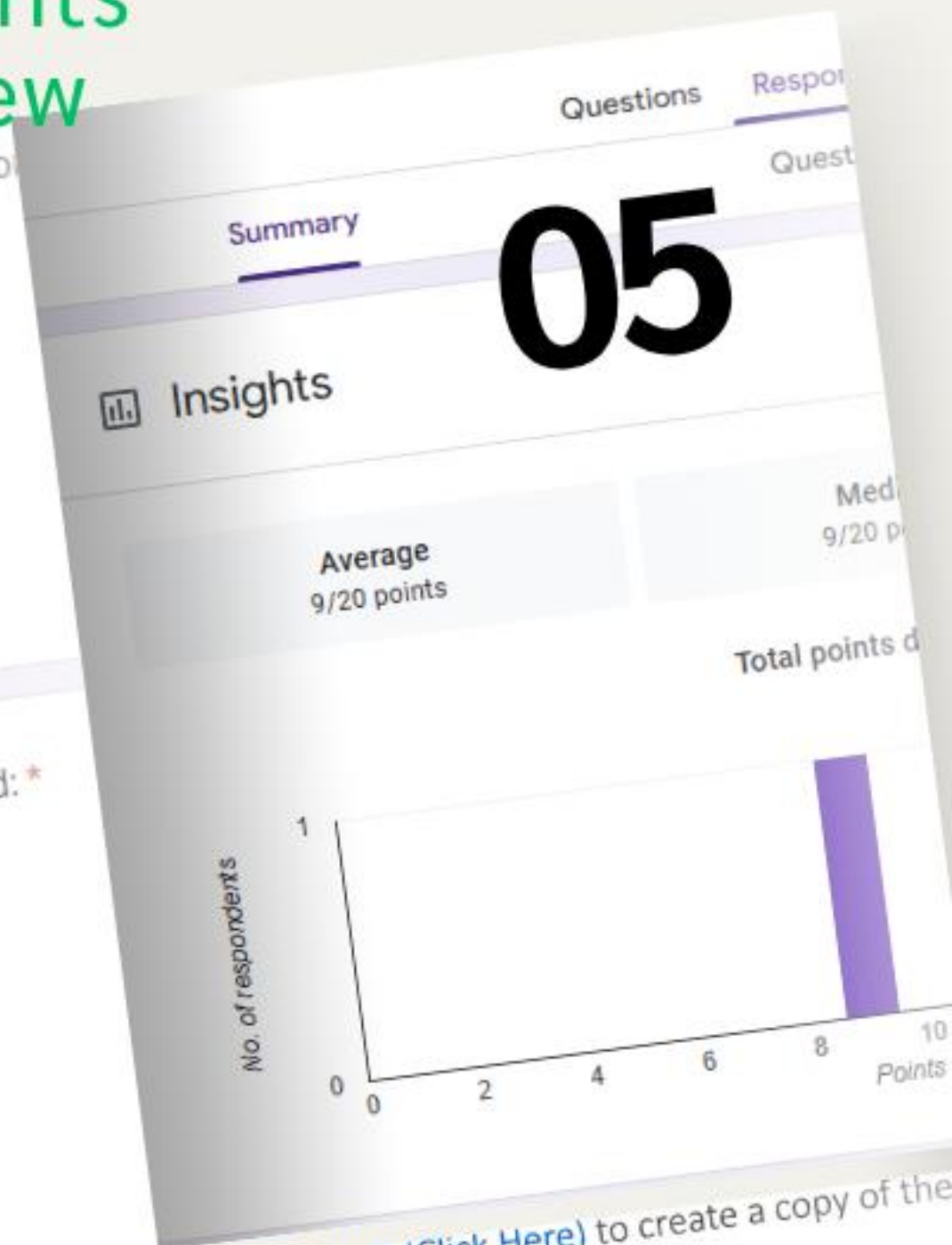

Answer Key

Sample Answer to Question 1

A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion and ends with a period.
Example: "The sky is blue."

Sample Answer to Question 2

To turn a declarative sentence into an interrogative sentence, add a question word or auxiliary verb and end with a question mark.
Example: "The sky is blue." becomes "Is the sky blue?"

Sample Answer to Question 3

The main purpose of an exclamatory sentence is to express strong emotion or excitement.

Sample Answer to Question 4

Common question words: Who, What, Where (also How, When, Why)

Sample Answer to Question 5

A period at the end of an imperative sentence gives it a command. An exclamation point adds urgency or emphasis.
